

AWA: WILDLIFE INDUSTRY TRENDS AND ANALYSIS FOR 2021













Key Industry News

- > The 2021 year has seen unprecedented activity in the wildlife market.
- The activity in auctions in the wildlife industry have not seen this buoyancy since the peak periods of the industry during 2014 to 2017.
- ➤ We have seen an abnormal increase in enquiries and requests for game since March 2021 through to October 2021 and double-digit revenue growth in our bi-monthly auctions against 2019/2020.
- > We have noticed some interesting trends in prices of certain species, increasing at a higher rate of inflation this past year.
- > These price increases are mainly due to the demand of certain species exceeding the supply.
- There is a noticeable shortfall in supply of several species in the market which will continue to impact positively on the pricing of these species for the foreseeable future.
- Prices of certain game species, like Zebra and Giraffe, which have been flat for the last ten years, has now seen a substantial upward trend this year.
- > This trend boasts positively for the future market growth of the industry.













Specific Market Trends related to clients

- > AWA over the past three years has projected certain changes to the industry in our Annual Game Price Industry Report.
- > Those projections and estimates are starting to realise this year and has an impact on market pricing.
- The dominance of major industry players (and breeders) in the game industry, relative to auctions, have substantially reduced in the past two years.
- The impact of this change can clearly be seen in the profile of current active buyers registering for auctions.
- ➤ Pre-2020 auctions were dominated by these major players, but the last two years have seen a complete realignment of the market to hunting, small and medium game farmers and breeders.
- The industry was dominated by these large and consortium game breeders during the periods 2014 to 2018, hosting major auctions and controlling the market spend for up to 75% of the annual revenue of the auction industry.













Specific Market Trends related to clients (Continued)

- > We have seen a major change to this trend during 2020 and even more prevalent in 2021.
- The major players are no longer investing as much in the game industry to the extent that they participated pre-2020.
- ➤ Latest estimates and analysis of buyers on auctions indicate that the market percentage spent of these major players have reduced drastically in context to the overall market.
- > The market spent is now dominated by hunting and small to medium game farm owners.
- ➤ These farmers contribute close to 80% of the current industry spend and continue to grow monthly.
- ➤ Very interesting is the growth of a new market segment driven by farmers investing in rare game due to the affordability of the current rare game prices.
- > It is currently, for example, more affordable to buy a Sable cow on auction than a Kudu cow.
- The lower prices allowed this market segment to actively participate, acquire and invest in the rare species market segment, which they previously could not participate in.













Specific Market Trends related to clients(Continued)

- > Drastic reductions in the rare game prices since 2017, created and established a new market segment for the industry.
- Most of these species are now affordable for this segment and the entry of these players created a huge market potential for the future of these species. Important to note that several new players have now entered this market segment.
- These players are all new entries to the market and have no history or recollection of the collapsed prices of the rare game market in 2017 to 2019.
- They see massive growth opportunities at these reset, lower prices and therefore new investments are starting to materialize again in the game industry.
- Their input base for acquiring rare game is substantially lower, thereby creating the possibility of materializing reasonable long-term returns on their investments.













Key statistical data for 2021

> Summary of specific specie price increases

- Certain specie prices have been impacted more than others due to the shortages of supply in the market.
- The "Bread and Butter" lines for local and corporate hunting, are currently experiencing the highest demand, therefore also seeing the biggest percentage increase in prices.
- The demand for venison in the market has also increased the pressure on game prices.
- The venison prices have continued to increase month to month, due to the shortfall
 of game in the industry.
- Prices continued to rise on most species since March 2021. We have seen some of the highest prices for certain species during August and October 2021.
- We believe it is important to highlight the following specific species:













Wildlife Industry Trends and Analysis

- The Wildlife Industry has seen some unprecedented changes in the past few years with the biggest impact in 2020 due to COVID-19.
- From the boom days in the industry in 2015 and 2016 to a complete change and reset in the market in 2017 with the downward trends continuing in 2018, 2019 and 2020.
- For the first time in six years (since 2016), we have seen positive growth in the wildlife Industry.
- Due to the proliferation of auction houses, it has become more and more difficult to obtain data from certain auction houses and specific auctions. The data we compiled and present in this document, we however believe is a fair indication of the market trends in the South African wildlife industry.
- Although certain outside factors contributed to the drastic reduction in prices of, for example colour variances, we believe the main reason for the price reset was the huge increase in supply of these species without an equal increase in demand.
- The industry needs to ensure that it creates a demand for these species, or we will continue to see a decline in certain specie prices. This will stabilize once the supply and demand ratio has been restored.

Wildlife Industry Trends and Analysis

- ➤ Current market indicators and trends, for all 2021 game auctions, indicate that the market has , for the first time in six years improved and growth has been prevalent in both Rare Game and Plains Game markets
- > Total revenue of game sale from auctions were as follow:
 - 2018 <u>declined</u> by 37% to R598m;
 - 2019 <u>declined</u> by 21% to 472m;
 - 2020 <u>declined</u> by 59% to R196m;
 - 2021 increased by 59% to R311m
 - Plains Game market grew by a staggering 94% during 2021 and rare game market by 44%. The Plains game growth was attributable to a growth in prices of 55% and price increases of 29%. The Rare Game market growth was mainly due to growth in numbers of 56% and an average reduction on rare game prices by 8%.










Total Revenue for the year



























- Total revenue generated from game sales:
 - 2017 revenue <u>declined</u> by 47%.
 - 2018 revenue <u>declined</u> by 39%.
 - 2019 revenue <u>declined</u> by 21%.
 - 2020 revenue <u>declined</u> by 58,6%.
 - 2021 revenue increased by 58.9% reversing the decline of 2020,
- > Total number of animals sold on auction:
 - 2017 quantities increased by 3%.
 - 2018 quantities <u>declined</u> by 20%.
 - 2019 quantities increased by 5%.
 - 2020 quantities <u>declined</u> by 37%.
 - 2021 quantities increased by 56%














Total Market Growth/Decline analysis

Pricing Trends of game on auction - Rare Game

- Detailed analysis of the rare game prices over the past four years indicated that the trends in the colour variance market are different from the rest of the rare game market.
- Statistical data were analysed in detail per specie, per category for colour variances and rare game species.
- Interesting trends emerged out of these analysis.
- ➤ We believe these trends and analysis can assist the game farmers with their planning and marketing of their game in 2021 and in the future.













Colour Variance Market Analysis (Golden Wildebeest, Black Impala etc.)

- Pricing of most colour variance species in 2021 are now at an average of <u>between 1% to 2 %</u> of the value received for the same species in 2015/2016.
- These trends are specific to those colour variances that have a growing market for the hunting industry.
- Certain other colour variance species like Saddleback Impala and Kings Wildebeest have a very limited demand in the hunting industry and therefore we have seen much higher reduction in prices for these species.
- Currently these species are only achieving 1% and less of their market prices achieved in 2015/2016.
- This analyses is measured by taking a specific animal's credentials in 2015/2016 and compare those prices to current prices in the market to similar credentials in 2021.













Non Colour Variance Analysis (Buffalo, Sable, Roan etc.)

- Analysis performed with data available indicated that the Sable, Roan and Buffalo species prices have also materially been affected the past few years, although not to the extent we have seen in the colour variant market reductions.
- These species on average are now selling at 5% to 10% of value achieved during the peak of 2015/2016. The price of Sable and Roan species seem to have stabilised during 2021.
- Prices in the Buffalo sales vary substantially from week to week in 2021, which is a clear indication that the stability in the Buffalo market has not yet settled and will continue to be volatile in 2022.
- These analyses are measured by taking a specific animal's credentials in 2015/2016 and compare those pricing to current prices in the market to similar or same credentials as were achieved in 2021.
- The top end of the market in these species showed a similar trend current to the lower end of the market for these specific species.










Rare Game Auction Revenue per year



























 - > Total number of rare game animals sold on auction:
 - 2017 quantities increased by 25%.
 - 2018 quantities <u>declined</u> by 18%.
 - 2019 quantities <u>declined</u> by 14%.
 - 2020 quantities <u>declined</u> by 36%.
 - 2021 quantities increased by 56%.

Roan, Livingstone Eland and Rhino average prices were impacted the most during the 2021 calendar year. We believe Sable prices have stabilised but we still see some instability in Buffalo prices in the coming year. Colour Variances have shown an increase in price for the first time in many years.













Sable Information

- The price of Sable has stabilised during this year and started to increase again. The average prices of sables have increased by 10% during 2021.
- Females are currently selling between R8 000 to R15 000 per female depending on the genetics.
- We have seen an increase in Sable females from the R6 500 low in the beginning of the year to the current R10 000 on average per female.
- The increase in Sable female prices are directly related to the shortfall of all species in the industry. Farmers are buying Sable females as they are now cheaper than most large plains game females.
- Sable bulls prices have increased from R350 per inch to currently trading at R500 to R700 per inch.
- Sable bulls with horns of above 46 inches are currently getting a premium price and can be as high as R800 per inch.














Sables Average price per animal















Roan Antelope

- Roan prices continued to declined further during the year but stabilised by the end of the year.
- The male and female prices have stabilised during 2021 and we have seen moderate increases in Roan prices over the last 4 months of the year.
- We do believe the Roan prices will continue to increase above CPI for the next few years and not decrease any further.
- Currently, females are selling between R12.5k to R20k per female depending on the genetics of each animal.
- Exceptional females still get premium prices but not to the extent of the past.
- There is a moderate demand for Roan males/hunting animals. Of all males/hunting animals, the demand for Roans are the lowest of all species.
- Roan males are currently selling between R10k to R25k depending on the horn size and age of the animals.
- We do not see the same trends in Roans as we see in the Sable market currently.














Roan Average price per animal















Female Buffalo analysis

- The Buffalo market pricing has not yet stabilised.
- Prices can vary tremendously from week to week, auction to auction.
- In Buffalo females with similar genetics, prices can vary with so much as 50% per animal.
- We however, do see a trend developing in the market where Buffalo that are held in boma are achieving better prices than Buffalo sold on catalogue. We believe that buyers want to see the animals and want delivery much quicker than in the past. Buyers of Buffalo are sceptic about quality of animals on catalogue and want to view the Buffalo before committing.
- Buffalo cows, depending on genetics and horn size, are currently selling at R25k for young heifers and between R30k to R40k for adult females. These prices clearly exclude exceptional Buffalo cows on auction with horn sizes above 35 inches.
- With cost of bleeding/testing per animal of between R8k to R10k each, the profitability of Buffalo breeding and selling are very challenging.













Buffalo Bulls Analysis

- Buffalo bulls prices are slightly down from the last two years.
- Only Buffalo bulls older than 6 years with hard bosses are getting reasonable prices.
- Young bulls are battling to get prices in the current market. We believe that with so many bulls in the market, the international PH's and hunters can pick and choose from hunting bulls.
- Hard boss older hunting bulls still get reasonable prices. Bulls older than 6 years with hard bosses currently get prices between R65k and R85k per animal. The horns spread however must be bigger than 38 inches.
- Bulls with horn spread above 44 inches still get a premium price in the market and are currently selling between R100k to R165k.
- We do believe the prices for hunting bulls will increase next year due to international hunters returning to South Africa.
- We believe there is an over supply of Buffalo in the market currently.














Buffalo Average price per animal
















Black Impala Average price per animal
















Golden Gnu Average price per animal
















Tsessebe Average price per animal
















Kings Wildebeest Average price per animal
















Livingston Eland Average price per animal


















Saddleback Impala Average price per animal









Wildlife Industry Trends and Analysis: PLAINS GAME













Pricing trends of game on auction – Plains Game

- Detailed analysis of the plains game prices over the past four years have indicated that the plains game prices were reasonably stable compared to the rare game market, with 2021 the exception, with phenomenal increase in prices.
- The plains game market on average shows a dramatic increase in game prices for certain species and above inflation increase in prices for the most sought after species in 2021.

 Average price increase for plains game were 25% in 2021.
- Quantities sold on auction increased substantially during the 2015 and 2016 peak but returned to normal quantities in 2017 and decreased by 21% in the 2018 season with an 11% increase in quantities in 2019 and a 40% decrease in 2020 quantities due to the impact of COVID-19. Quantities for 2021 increased by a staggering 54%.
- Statistical data were analysed in detail per specie per category for all plains game species.



























Plains Game quantities per year sold on auction











Pricing trends of game on auction – Plains Game

- > All plains game species shown an increase in average prices as well as quantities;
- > Kudu and Bluewildebeest were the best performing game based on average prices.
- > Kudu bulls prices were impacted by the low demand for international hunting bulls that limited the average prices for these species at 18%.
- > Eland and gemsbuck prices continued to grow above inflation for the third year running.
- ➤ Giraffe and Zebra prices increased for the first time in a long time, indicating the meat market is starting to impact on the prices of these two species.
- ➤ Prices during the last 3 months of the year were on average 20% higher than the start of the year for all species.
- ➤ Plains game quantities increased drastically during the year and we estimate this will continue during 2022.
- ➤ We however do not believe the prices will continue to rise in 2022 at the rates we saw during 2021.














Normal Blesbuck Average price per animal
















Normal Bluewildebeest Average price per animal









Wildlife Industry Trends and Analysis: Summary and Conclusion













Key statistical data for 2021 - Summary

- > Plains game prices have increased on average by 24% this year.
- Certain species like Kudu cows, Waterbuck and Red Hartebeest have increased more than 40% year on year.
- > There is a huge shortage of bushveld animals currently in the market.
- ➤ All male hunting animals are still getting premium prices on auction and we believe this will escalate when the international hunters return next year.
- > Buffalo prices continue to be under severe pressure and have not stabilised yet.
- Sable prices have stabilised and we have seen a moderate increase on all Sable categories.
- > Roan prices are flat and hasn't shown any substantial movements this year.
- Female plains game is in huge demand and are currently achieving the best prices since the "boom" period.
- > Current prices make it profitable for farmers to invest in the industry again.













* Rationale of the increase in prices of certain species

Several factors impacted on the shortage of supply of certain species in the market. We believe they can be categorised and explained as follows:

- > Supply shortage created by extensive breeding projects
 - Several game farm owners converted portions of their farms into breeding camps. This reduced the natural habitat for breeding of certain species. These farm owners also reduced their plains game breeding projects and focused on extensive breeding for rare game species. This impacted the breeding and growth of certain plains game species like Blue Wildebeest females.
- Long-term drought in the catchment area
 - The impact of the last 7 years of below normal rainfall has had a severe impact on some of the species. The shortfall of Kudu cows and Red Hartebeest (to name a few) species can directly be attributed to the last years of drought in certain areas
- > Demand for venison meat driven by several factors
 - The production of venison meat has materially increased in the past three years. There are now several "culling" outfitters that focus on supplying venison to butcheries and the export meat market. This new market segment has substantially reduced the availability of certain species to the auction market and set a new "low" price.
- > Lack of international hunting forcing game farmers to cater for local and corporate hunting
 - Several hunting farms catering exclusively for international hunters were forced to move into the local market to ensure their survival. They are now catering for corporate and local hunters and require the necessary game species on their farms to accommodate this market segment. Most of these farms focused mainly on male and trophy animals in the past. They needed to stock up for the new market segment and have started buying mostly plains game species for their farms.













Trend Comparison between Auction and Culling Prices

- Demand for meat/venison has grown exponentially over the last three years. This demand for venison has impacted on the supply to game auctions during the past two years. Weak prices in certain species made it more profitable to cull animals than sell on auctions.
- For species, like Giraffe and Zebra, meat or culling prices are more attractive to game farm owners than capturing and selling on auctions.
- The following table will explain the interaction and impact this has had on prices:

Market Segment Analysis

- Contrary to the decrease in revenue in game auctions since 2017, we have seen a phenomenal increase in new entry (buyers) in the market.
- First time buyers or new buyer's registrations are up by over 50% year on year at AWA auctions, averaging over 20 new registrations per auction.
- Online registrations growing at a phenomenal rate of 100% per auction on last year's numbers.
- AWA has on average 90 online bidders per auction, 30 telephone bidders and between 20 to 30 buyers in the hall.
- The average total number of registrations on auction are up by 30% year on year so far.
- Registrations have exceeded 150 bidders per auction this year.
- These registration quantities are substantially higher than the last two years' numbers.














SELLING RATE: HALL VS ONLINE

- The Pandemic of Covid-19 has forced the industry to move more rapidly to online and internet technology.
- ➤ Contrary to announcements in the media regarding online technology, AWA was the first auction house in South Africa to offer live webcast and online bidding on the internet platform, since 2014.
- AWA has hosted more than 300 online and live webcast auctions over the past 7 years and arguably has one of the most stable and user-friendly online platforms in the industry.
- AWA is the only auction house that owns and uses its <u>own</u> streaming technology and does not rely on partners to ensure the quality of streaming on their auctions.
- Wildlife Auctions (AWA's platform) currently has over 7 500 registered users on its website. 50% Of these registered users are active users and participate using the website and App functionalities regularly.
- Most of the users have actively used the website and App for many years and are very comfortable with the functionality and technology available on the platforms, which improves AWA's take-up for every auction.













Summary and outlook for the rest of the year and 2022

- > AWA believes that the current buoyancy in the market will continue for the balance of the year and next year.
- The shortages in species will continue to be prevalent in the market and therefore impact and continue to impact on the game prices for the rest of the year.
- > We believe the prices of all species seem to have stabilised except for Buffalo which is not aligned to the rest of game prices.
- ➤ We still foresee instability in Buffalo prices for the rest of the year.
- > The Buffalo market pricing is still very unstable, and prices can substantially vary from week to week.
- > There are also large quantities of Buffalo for sale in the market.
- Most of the game species prices have now reset after the "boom" years and the sellers and buyers of game can look forward to much more stable prices with material increase in certain plains game species and moderate increase year on year for the rare game species.
- ➤ We foresee reasonable price increases on Nyala and Sable bull prices, which is a reversal to last year whereby both these species were still in a declining phase.
- > We believe we will continue to see increases in all plains game prices and moderate increases in rare game specie prices, excluding Buffalo.
